Course activities were clustered around site work, developing activist projects, reading, and personal reflection/writing. Topics and contexts included Occupy, gentrification, extractive capitalism, Standing Rock, resistance/art/imagination, fascism, the media industry, social media, fake news, consumerism, non-violence, climate change, revolution, student movements, emerging issues and current affairs.

Designed and taught curriculum on how to engage with the theory and practice of social justice focusing on struggles in New York City.
